First of all we do apologize to those who have gotten our March printed Newsletter in May. We checked May 3<sup>rd</sup> with our Prayer letter mission in the U.S. that we did not get the bill for printing and mailing and found out that our March Prayer Letter was not processed at all. We do not know what happened.

On April 20<sup>th</sup> our troop of visitors arrived. They left Boston the same evening just before the town was completely shut down because of the search for those involved in the marathon bombing event. For a while there was confusion about who did the terrorist act, and since Czechs and Chechens are often stateside confused for the same nation we got unwelcomed attention. To erase Czech Republic from the map was an opportunity for all Czech people living in America to explain that Czechs are not to be blamed. A few days later the Czech community in West, TX, a well-known place of Czech Kolache Festivals was badly hit by explosion.

Let's go back to our joyful time with grandkids. Our younger son stayed one week, father of four grandkids left after 10 days. Can you imagine seven visitors plus two of us in a three bedroom apartment? What a joy and what a noise. We took turns with our maternal grandma in-law (Babi). Each of us had two exchanges; one week at her house, one week in our apartment.

Together we did several trips, near and far. The boys especially had fun with uncle and grandpa. We took them to the place where Klara was born, and since it is about 10 miles from Herenhut we added a few special side trips like the Mission museum, Meissen, a famous porcelain factory and Dresden. Boys and uncles enjoyed the border crossing to Germany and Poland, jumping over the line back and forth. What a change! What used to be an iron curtain during communist era is now just a border marker.

My tutor Jo, our adopted girl from Ethiopia, was constantly correcting my pronunciation of "three and tree". Her English vocabulary and linguistic intuition is just amazing. Since Babi does not speak English, Jo was the only one of the grandkids who communicated with her without any problem. At the village where Babi lives, the kids had a ball with a new family dog (huge one). We laughed that all four of the kids learned to give Aida, the new dog, commands only in Czech.
