OVERSHADOWED SUMMER DAYS

This year's summer was lovely. Temperatures were rather mild, we got enough rain, and grass was not scorched. It was a great time to work and relax close to home. However, this idyll was disrupted by several terrorist attacks and events too close for comfort. We were shocked as France and Germany, places we know so well, were hit. Some European countries are less safe than usual. For those reasons people travel less and spend their time more often close home. That news overshadowed Brexit. Brits are leaving the European Union and this was overshadowed by Turkish coup. Immediately a three-month state of emergency was declared; and a crackdown on the military, judiciary, civil service, police and educational institutions. Over 100,000 Turks were arrested. All those events make all of Europe nervous. There are about 8 million Muslims in France; and 25 % of French youth under 15 were born to Muslims. Great Brittan has its

share too. About 5% of its population is Muslim; and 47% of UK's Muslims are already UK born. Almost 80% of them live in the Greater London's inner city. Germany has about 5 million Muslims, predominantly Turks. Turkey is an important NATO member. However, now questions arise about the new local power triangle Ankara - Moscow - Teheran. Turkey is becoming far from stable and safe democracy. As an Islamic country they openly support unrest in the Middle East. In 2013 we had an HCJB European Conference close to Istanbul, Turkey. We shared the hotel's conference facilities with the Syrian Muslim Brotherhood. Turkey is the key player in Europe and Middle East. It controls most of the refugee flow to Europe. Over 3 million refugees and migrants are in Turkey waiting to be smuggled to Europe. At the present time there is over 65 million of people who left their home and are seeking asylum. Half of them are from Afghanistan, Syria, Iraq and Somalia, more than half of them are young males.

A BIT OF CZECH PROTESTANT HISTORY

The Bohemian Reformation (also known as the Czech Reformation or Hussite Reformation), preceding the Protestant Reformation of the 16th century, was a Christian movement in the late medieval and early modern Kingdom and Crown of Bohemia (present-day Czech Republic) striving for a reform of the Roman Catholic Church. Lasting for more than 200 years, it had a significant impact on the historical development of Central Europe and is considered one of the most important religious, social, intellectual and political movements of the early modern period. The Bohemian Reformation produced the first national church sepa-

rate from Roman authority, the first radical apocalyptic religious movements of the early modern period, and the first pacifist Protestant church.

The Bohemian Reformation was not an internally unified movement and did not remain immutable. Although it split in many groups, some characteristics were shared by all of them – communion under both kinds, distaste for the wealth and power of the church, emphasis on the Bible preached in a vernacular language and on an immediate relationship between man and God. The Bohemian Reformation include particularly the efforts to reform the church before Hus, the Hussite movement (including e. g. Taborites and Orebites), the Unity of the Brethren and Utraquists or Calixtines.

Together with the Waldensians and the Lollards (led by John Wycliffe), the Bohemian Reformation is considered to be the precursor to the Protestant Reformation. These movements are sometimes referred to as the First Reformation in the Czech historiography. Despite the influence of the German and Swiss Reformations, the Bohemian Reformation did not bleed into them, although many of Czech Utraquists grew closer and closer to the Lutherans. The Bohemian Reformation kept its own development until the suppression of the Bohemian Revolt in 1620. The victorious restored King Ferdinand II decided to force every inhabitant of Bohemia and Moravia to become Roman Catholic in accordance with the principle cuius regio, eius religio of the Peace of Augsburg (1555). The Bohemian Reformation ended up being diffused in the Protestant world and gradually lost its distinctiveness. The Patent of Toleration issued in 1781 by Emperor Joseph II did not lead to a restoration of the Bohemian Reformation. Joseph II did not respect the Bohemian religious tradition and therefore only Lutheran, Calvinist and Eastern Orthodox faiths were made legal in the Crown of Bohemia and other parts of his realm. In spite of the extinction of the Bohemian Reformation as a distinctive Christian movement, its tradition did not disappear. Many churches do not forget their legacy, refer to the Bohemian Reformation and try to continue its tradition, e. g. the Moravian Church (the continuator of the scattered Unity of the Brethren), Protestant Church of Czech Brethren, Czechoslovak Hussite Church, Church of Brethren, Unity of Brethren Baptists and other.

ORIGINS

The Bohemian Reformation started in Praque in the second half of the 14th century. In that time Prague was not only the seat of the King of Bohemia but also of the Holy Roman Emperor. Prague was one of the Europe's largest cities and after Avignon, Rome and Paris was the city with the highest concentration of clergy in the Western Christendom. The beginnings of the Bohemian Reformation were closely related to the criticism of the lavish lifestyle of many priests. In the late 1370's and early 1380's the Prague University theologians and intellectuals called for the reform of the decadent priesthood in the spirit of emerging conciliarism, for education of unsatisfactorily educated priests, and for more frequent accepting of the Eucharist in the spirit of Devotio Moderna. The most significant representatives of the university reform movement were Henry of Bitterfeld and Matthew of Cracow.

Apart from the university theologians there were also reform preachers, such as Conrad Waldhauser (died in 1369), an Austrian Augustinian from a monastery in Waldhausen who preached in the Old Town of Prague in German and Latin especially against simony and low morals. Another influential preacher was Milí of Krom íž who preached in Latin, Czech, and German. He helped many prostitutes to begin a new life. Matthias of Janov (died in 1394) who studied at the University of Prague and at the University of Paris wrote Regulae Veteris et Novi Testamenti (Principles of the Old and the New Testaments) which is an essential book of

the early Bohemian Reformation movement. The Bible was the only reliable authority in all matters of faith for him and only sincere followers of Christ were true Christians in his opinion.

The complete translation of the Bible into Czech in the mid-14th century also contributed to the origin of the Bohemian Reformation. After French and Italian the Czech language became the third modern European language in which the whole Bible was translated
