We met for the first time on August 11, 1964, and almost a year later, we were married. Little did we know that this chance meeting would set in motion a series of events that would redirect our lives. The second-anniversary date to remember is August 21, 1968. It is 55 years this month, since the treacherous Russian invasion, and forty years of communist domination. The third Anniversary is August 11, 1969, when we became refugees. We can rejoice; America gave us a new chance. We were free of ideological oppression for the first

time. What is most important, after eight years in the US our Lord saved us.

MEMORIAL SERVICE FOR ONE OF PAVEL'S GEOLOGICAL UNIVERSITY CLASSMATES IN KLADNO

About 15 years ago at one of the reunions, Pavel openly shared his belief in Christ with a classmate who recently deceased. She ridiculed his faith and expressed her wonder; how strange it is that a geologist can believe in such things as young earth etc. She even refused to allow us to mail her the magazine which we have published for 34 years. As we learned from her family, she shared with them an encounter with Pavel; however, that did not change her atheistic conviction.

During the memorial service, not one word was mentioned about the end of life. As the casket rolled into the darkness, it was obvious that no glory awaited her at the end of the tunnel. First cremation and then the judgment:

And as it is appointed unto men once to die, but after this the judgment: (Hebrew 9:27)

How sad. The gathering of the mourners consisted of the family members – children and grandchildren, and former colleagues and graduates of geological sciences, holding significant professional positions; now retired. Most of their children followed the parental example. The question arose in conversation: Why is it important for convinced materialists and atheists to perform a memorial service? Though they openly denounced the notion of spiritual values, they were very sensitive about all injustice in the world, the society, wrongdoing, and wrong acting, the evil in the past and present. They denied God but lived as if there was a god. No wonder, after living all their professional life under communism this was evident. On the other side, they mentioned valid criticism of the historical religious wars and misconduct of churches, sexual abuse, etc.

However, they admitted that the deceased deserves respect and remembrance because she was a good person. The wicked are rather the exception, not the rule. This describes quite an accurate state of mind of an intelligent, educated and humanly speaking accomplished generation that lacks spiritual values concerning human life based on the word of God. For those nearing the end of their lives, the possibility that there is final justice and the judge is God, fell on deaf ears: "You won't convince me ..." In vain Pavel tried to explain that it is not in our human power to convince anyone; only God can do it.

At least the widowed husband paid attention to what Pavel had to say at the end of the funeral feast. He somewhat agreed that human beings may be more than a chemical compound.

We mentioned to him that we drive every Sunday to Kladno to attend church; he recounted that as a child he used to attend church with Grandma. As we left, he said, "Maybe I'll come *see you?*"

ANOTHER ENCOUNTER

Our friend's 50th birthday was this month. We've known her for about ten years. We met her on a sightseeing trip to Turkey. We've been seeing each other on special occasions. The whole family is tolerant of our faith in Christ. They listen and that's it. No response. However, to celebrate her 50th birthday she invited her 74-year-old "adopted" uncle. Uncle Václav (Wenceslaus) listened to Pavel's explanation of the gospel and had many questions, and Pavel saw that his eyes were moist. As we said goodbye, he asked for our email address. A few days later he wrote, looked at our website, and asked if we could see each other sometime. God's ways are so unexpected! Please pray for him.

When our IT wizard, Vladimir, helped Pavel to resolve a huge problem that occurred after an automated update of his PC, Klara had the opportunity to have a glimpse of Vladimir's tutoring on what this new AI technology software can do. The resources, speed, inspiration, ideas, themes, and possibilities are astonishing. Is this another path to impersonal communication addiction, or to learn how to use it to the best? She admits it has captured her attention. Here is the result of the first step in the AI Adventure and New World challenge; "Write a short essay on election, voluntary predestination, and free choice." First came term definitions followed by the philosophical conclusion:

Title: Election, Voluntary Predestination, and Personal Responsibility:
